CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

Dear Fellow Shareholders,

On behalf of the Board of Directors, it is my pleasure to present the 2022 Annual Report for Pinnacle Minerals Limited ('Company'), the first Annual Report since listing on ASX.

Pinnacle (ASX: PIM) listed on the ASX on the 23rd March 2022 after raising \$4.5m to fund its exploration activities targeting kaolin and kaolin-halloysite in Western Australia and South Australia.

Kaolin has attractive fundamentals with growing utilisation and rising popularity in the industrial mineral sector.

The initial focus for our exploration is the Bobalong Project.

The 100% owned Bobalong Project, consists of two granted tenements covering approximately 116.61km² of tenure and one application, located approximately 130km north of the Port of Albany and within 20kms of the town of Tambellup, Western Australia. This location provides access to essential services, the sealed Great Southern Highway, a State Government Standard Gauge Rail, Western Power transmission lines, Government Water Authority Supply services, and other government, health, and education services.

The Company's initial field programs have focused on the Bill's Middle target within the Bobalong Project area. Completion of the first phase drilling program at Bobalong has confirmed the presence of extensive mineralisation of exceptional quality, these results indicate the potential for a high value product suitable for direct shipping ore (DSO) export.

Going forward on the Bobalong Project, Pinnacle intends to recommence discussions with potential offtake partners for a DSO kaolin product, though the Company will be in a position to provide further detailed commentary upon the receipt and interpretation of assay results. At this stage, Pinnacle is using initial findings from the first phase drilling program to commence preliminary planning for potential operations at the Bobalong Project.

In addition to the West of Bobalong at Kojonup, Western Australia, the Company holds two granted exploration tenements covering an area of 268km² at the Holly Project, which features identified kaolin following historic drilling by CRA in 1995, with targeted drilling planned upon completion of land access agreements. The Company also holds three tenements applications at the White Knight Project and a tenement application at the Camel Lake Project in South Australia (SA), both of which have an extensive exploration history, with extensive kaolin recorded but never followed up, and are strategically located adjacent to Andromeda Metals' (ASX:ADN) high-grade kaolin-halloysite discoveries in SA.

I would like to take this opportunity, on behalf of the Board, to thank all our Shareholders for their ongoing support.

I would also like to thank management and my fellow Directors for their ongoing efforts. We are committed to progressing the Company by exploring and testing high-quality targets that can lead to significant discoveries on our extensive holdings in Western Australian and South Australia to grow the Company for the benefit of all Pinnacle shareholders.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS - OVERVIEW

Pinnacle Minerals Limited (ASX: PIM) listed on the Australian Securities exchange (ASX) on the 23rd March 2022 raising \$4.5m by issuing 25m new shares (\$0.20) to fund exploration activities targeting kaolin and kaolin-halloysite in Western Australian and South Australia.

Pinnacle entered into two share sale agreements, one with Bulk Minerals Pty Ltd (covering the White Knight, Camel Lake, and Holly Kaolin Projects), and one with Witby Clays Pty Ltd (covering the Bobalong Kaolin Project), acquiring a 100% interest in the tenements and tenement applications.

The Bobalong Project covers approximately 116.61km² of tenure located approximately 130km north of the Port of Albany and within 20kms of the town of Tambellup. This location provides access to essential services, the sealed Great Southern Highway, a State Government Standard Gauge Rail, Western Power transmission lines, Government Water Authority Supply services, and other government, health, and education services. Kaolin has attractive fundamentals with growing utilisation and rising popularity in the industrial mineral sector.

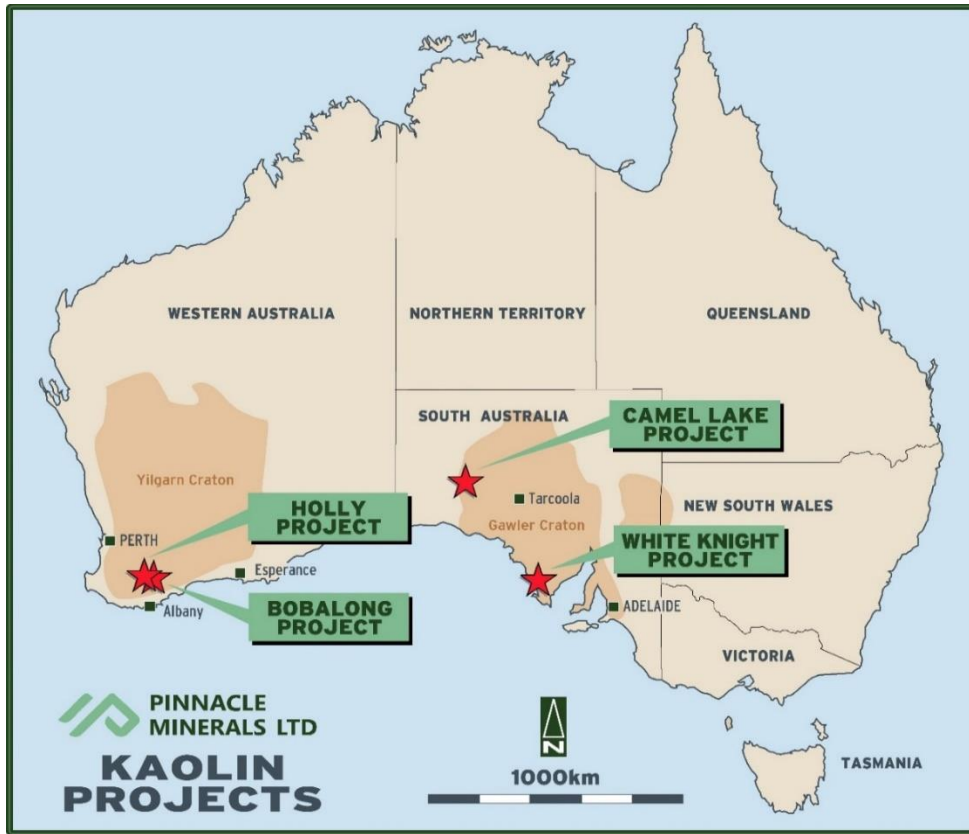


Figure 1. Pinnacle Project locations

In addition to Bobalong at Tambellup, Western Australia, the Company holds two granted exploration tenements covering an area of 268km² at the Holly Project, which features identified kaolin following historic drilling by CRA in 1995, with targeted drilling planned upon completion of land access agreements. The Company also holds three tenements at the White Knight Project and a tenement application at the Camel Lake Project in South Australia, both of which have an extensive exploration history, with extensive kaolin recorded but never followed up, and are strategically located adjacent to Andromeda Metals' (ASX:ADN) high-grade kaolin-halloysite discoveries in SA. Project locations are presented in Figure 1.

Since listing the Company's initial field programs focused on the Bill's Middle and Tambellup East targets within the Bobalong Project area. Field assessments across the Bill's Middle kaolin prospects confirmed the presence of extensive mineralisation of exception quality at 38.3% Al₂O₃ and 45.9% SiO₂, high whiteness and high brightness of 80% to 85%; with a small particle size, high opacity, and low impurities. These results indicate the potential for a high value product suitable for direct shipping ore (DSO) export, via the deep-water port of Albany, 133km to the south.

8. FINANCIAL POSITION

As at 30 June 2022, the Group's cash and cash equivalents was \$3,804,953, working capital was \$3,834,178 and net assets were \$6,330,827.

The consolidated entity's financial position has enabled the Group to limit its borrowings to internal parties and not to external financial institutions. This maintains a satisfactory working capital ratio.

The directors believe the Group is in a satisfactorily stable financial position to continue its current operations.

9. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Group during the period ended 30 June 2022.

10. EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO REPORTING DATE

The Group completed a Loyalty Option offer in August 2022 with the issue of 20,687,634 options exercisable at \$0.25 on or before 20 July 2026. The Loyalty Option offer raised \$90,938 before costs.

Mr. Maurice (Nic) Matich was appointed as the Chief Executive Officer of the Company on the 19th September 2022.

The practices of negotiation and annual review of Executive Directors' performance and remuneration are carried out by the Non-Executive Directors of the Board. The Chairman of the Board who makes recommendations to the full board, undertakes, in an informal way, the review of the Non-Executive Directors remuneration.

The Board will meet at least annually or as required, usually on the anniversary date of each service agreement for the particular Director and or Executive. At these meetings, the particular Director and/or Executive will declare his/her interest and not vote, as well he/she will depart from the meeting, so as not to be present whilst the issue is being discussed.

Given the nature and size of the Company there has been no requirement to engage the services of a remuneration consultant for the period ended 30 June 2022.

i. Remuneration of Non-executive Directors

Total remuneration for Non-executive Directors is not to exceed \$250,000 per annum, excluding options which are approved separately at a general meeting. Non-Executive Directors' fees are set with reference to fees paid to other Non-Executive Directors of comparable companies and are presently \$60,000 per annum for the Non-Executive Chair and \$45,000 per annum for the Non-Executive Directors. The Executive Director receives a fee of \$110,000 per annum plus superannuation for 60% time. Non-Executive Director's remuneration is reviewed annually by the Non-executive Directors of the Board.

ii. Share trading policy

The trading of shares issued to participants under any of the Company's employee equity plans is subject to, and conditional upon, compliance with the Company's employee share trading policy, publicly available via the ASX.

iii. Remuneration Framework

The executive remuneration framework has two components:

- base pay and benefits, including superannuation where applicable; and
- long term incentives. Director Options have been issued to each Director as a part of their total remuneration, these Options are exercisable on or before the date which is 3 years from the date of quotation, 23 March 2025, exercisable at \$0.25.

The executive remuneration mix is consistent with that of an exploration company in that pay is currently not based on the performance of the Company and both components of the executives target pay are not at risk.

For the first measurement period the directors have assessed that there are no current reporting requirements, but may be required to do so in the future.

18. NON-AUDIT SERVICES

During the year, Hall Chadwick Audit (WA) Pty Ltd, the Group's auditor, prepared the Investigating Accountant's Report for the Initial Public Offering Prospectus.

- the conditions for deductibility imposed by tax legislation continuing to be complied with and the company meeting either its continuity of ownership test or in the absence of satisfying that test the company can satisfy the same business test; and
- there being no changes in tax legislation which would adversely affect the Group from realising the benefits from the losses.

In the event that the Group fails to satisfy these conditions above or the Commissioner of Taxation challenges the Group's ability to utilise its losses, the Group may be liable for future income tax on assessable income derived by the company.

Balances disclosed in the financial statements and the notes thereto, related to taxation, are based on the best estimates of directors. These estimates consider both the financial performance and position of the company as they pertain to current income taxation legislation, and the directors understanding thereof. No adjustment has been made for pending or future taxation legislation. The current income tax position represents that directors' best estimate, pending an assessment by tax authorities in relevant jurisdictions.

4.2 Accounting Policy

The income tax expense or revenue for the period is the tax payable on the current period's taxable income based on the national income tax rate for each jurisdiction adjusted by changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements, and to unused tax losses.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for temporary differences at the tax rates expected to apply when the assets are recovered or liabilities are settled, based on those tax rates which are enacted or substantively enacted for each jurisdiction. The relevant tax rates are applied to the cumulative amounts of deductible and taxable temporary differences to measure the deferred tax asset or liability. An exception is made for certain temporary differences arising from the initial recognition of an asset or a liability. No deferred tax asset or liability is recognised in relation to these temporary differences if they arose in a transaction, other than a business combination, that at the time of the transaction did not affect either accounting profit or taxable profit or loss.

5.3.2 Accounting Policy

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the consolidated entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Payables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current liabilities. All other payables are classified as non-current liabilities.

5.4 Other Significant Accounting Policies related to Financial Assets and Liabilities

5.4.1 Financial Instruments – Assets

a. Classification

The Group classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through OCI or through profit or loss), and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The classification depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flows.

For assets measured at fair value, gains and losses will either be recorded in profit or loss or OCI. For investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading, this will depend on whether the Group has made an irrevocable election at the time of initial recognition to account for the equity investment at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI).

The Group reclassifies debt investments when and only when its business model for managing those assets changes.

b. Recognition and derecognition

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on trade-date, the date on which the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset. Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

c. Measurement

At initial recognition, the Group measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at FVTPL are expensed in profit or loss.

Financial assets with embedded derivatives are considered in their entirety when determining whether their cash flows are solely payment of principal and interest.

i) Debt instruments

Subsequent measurement of debt instruments depends on the Group's business model for managing the asset and the cash flow characteristics of the asset. There are three measurement categories into which the Group classifies its debt instruments:

- **Amortised cost:** Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortised cost. Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition is recognised directly in profit or loss and presented in other gains/(losses) together with foreign exchange gains and losses. Impairment losses are presented as separate line item in the statement of profit or loss.
- **FVOCI:** Assets that are held for collection of contractual cash flows and for selling the financial assets, where the assets' cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest, are

measured at FVOCI. Movements in the carrying amount are taken through OCI, except for the recognition of impairment gains or losses, interest income and foreign exchange gains and losses which are recognised in profit or loss. When the financial asset is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in OCI is reclassified from equity to profit or loss and recognised in other gains/(losses). Interest income from these financial assets is included in finance income using the effective interest rate method. Foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in other gains/(losses) and impairment expenses are presented as separate line item in the statement of profit or loss.

- FVTPL: Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortised cost or FVOCI are measured at FVTPL. A gain or loss on a debt investment that is subsequently measured at FVTPL is recognised in profit or loss and presented net within other gains/(losses) in the period in which it arises. Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the loans and receivables are derecognised or impaired, as well as through the amortisation process.

ii) Equity instruments

- The Group subsequently measures all equity investments at fair value. Where the Group's management has elected to present fair value gains and losses on equity investments in OCI, there is no subsequent reclassification of fair value gains and losses to profit or loss following the derecognition of the investment. Dividends from such investments continue to be recognised in profit or loss as other income when the Group's right to receive payments is established.
- Changes in the fair value of financial assets at FVTPL are recognised in other gains/(losses) in the statement of profit or loss as applicable. Impairment losses (and reversal of impairment losses) on equity investments measured at FVOCI are not reported separately from other changes in fair value.

a. Classification

The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the amortised cost of a financial liability.

b. Recognition and derecognition

Regular way purchases of financial liabilities are recognised on trade-date, the date on which the Group commits to purchase the financial liability. Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or have expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liabilities derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

c. Measurement

A regular review is undertaken of each area of interest to determine the appropriateness of continuing to carry forward costs in relation to that area of interest.

The recoverability of the carrying amount of the exploration and evaluation assets is dependent on successful development and commercial exploitation, or alternatively sale, of the respective area of interest.

This note provides a list of the significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements to the extent they have not already been disclosed in the other notes above. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

21.1 Basis of preparation

21.1.1 Reporting Entity

Pinnacle Minerals Limited is a listed public company limited by shares, domiciled and incorporated in Australia. The Company's registered office is at L1/389 Oxford Street, Mount Hawthorn WA. These are the consolidated financial statements and notes of Pinnacle Minerals Limited (the Company) and controlled entities (collectively the Group). The financial statements comprise the consolidated financial statements of the Group. For the purposes of preparing the consolidated financial statements, the Company is a for-profit entity. The Group is a for-profit entity and is primarily involved in the exploration, development and mining of minerals.

The separate financial statements of Pinnacle Minerals Limited, as the parent entity, have not been presented with this financial report as permitted by the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth).

21.1.2 Basis of accounting

These financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AAS Board) and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB), and the *Corporations Act 2001* (Cth).

Australian Accounting Standards (AASBs) set out accounting policies that the AAS Board has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Compliance with AASBs ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with IFRS as issued by the IASB.

The financial statements were authorised for issue on 29 September 2022 by the directors of the Company.

21.1.3 Going Concern

The 30 June 2022 financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis that contemplates the continuity of normal business activities and the realization of assets and extinguishment of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

The Group incurred a loss for the year of \$1,000,367 and a net cash inflow from operating, investing, and financing activities of \$3,804,953.

As at 30 June 2022, the Company had working capital of \$3,834,178, as disclosed in Note 9 which was attributable to a successful capital raising of \$4,500,000 during the year.

The Company was incorporated on 3 November 2021 and this being the first set of annual report prepared, there are no comparative figures presented.

21.2 Principles of Consolidation

As at reporting date, the assets and liabilities of all controlled entities have been incorporated into the consolidated financial statements as well as their results for the year then ended. Where controlled entities have entered (left) the Consolidated Group during the year, their operating results have been included (excluded) from the date control was obtained (ceased).

21.2.1 Subsidiaries

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets, liabilities and results of the parent, Pinnacle Minerals Limited and its subsidiaries. Subsidiaries are entities the parent controls. The parent controls an entity when it is exposed to, or has right to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity. A list of the subsidiaries is provided in Note 10.

The assets, liabilities and results of all subsidiaries are fully consolidated into the financial statements of the Group from the date on which control is obtained by the Group. The consolidation of a subsidiary is discontinued from the date that control ceases. Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains or losses on transactions between group entities are fully eliminated on consolidation. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed and adjustments made where necessary to ensure uniformity of the accounting policies adopted by the group.



Equity interests in a subsidiary not attributable, directly or indirectly, to the Group are presented as non-controlling interests. The Group initially recognises non-controlling interests that are present ownership interests in subsidiaries and are entitled to a proportionate share of the subsidiary's net assets on liquidation at either fair value or at the non-controlling interests' proportionate share of the subsidiary's net assets. Subsequent to initial recognition, non-controlling interests are attributed their share of profit or loss and each component of other comprehensive income. Non-controlling interests are shown separately within the equity section of the statement of financial position and statement of comprehensive income.

21.3 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the consolidated statement of financial position

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority, are presented as operating cash flow.

21.4 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of consolidated financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. These estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

Judgements made by management in the application of AASBs that have significant effect on the consolidated financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustment in the next year are discussed in 21.4.1.

21.4.1 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Judgements, estimates and assumptions are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. The Group makes assumptions concerning the future. All judgements, estimates and assumptions made are believed to be reasonable based on the most current set of circumstances available to management. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts and assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed further at Note 6.2.3.

21.5 NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS

Standards and interpretations applicable to 30 June 2022

In the period ended 30 June 2022, the Directors have reviewed all of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB that are relevant to the Company's operations and effective for the current financial reporting period.

It has been determined by the Directors that there is no impact, material or otherwise, of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations on its business and, therefore, no change is necessary to Company accounting policies.

Standards and interpretations on issue not yet effective and adopted

The Directors have also reviewed all new Standards and Interpretations that have been issued but are not yet effective for the period ended 30 June 2022. As a result of this review the Directors have determined that there is no impact, material or otherwise, of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations issued but not yet effective and adopted on its business and, therefore, no further disclosures have been made in this regard.
